
Legend for Hawaiian Hula Instruments & Implements



1. **PŪNIU**: small knee drum with fish-skin top, over a large coconut-shell base, made with coconut fiber cordage and a base ring of tapa (bark cloth) over coiled vines.

2. PŪ'ILI: slit-bamboo wands which rustle as they strike shoulders, palms, or each other during dance.

3. **KŪPE'E**: smooth shells or dogs' canine teeth fixed to a stout netting and worn on the calves to make a clicking sound during dance steps.

4. **IPU HEKE**: "drum" made from two gourds glued and stitched together, with tapa handle and burnedin decoration.

5. **'ILI'ILI**: "castanets" of water-worn hard basalt stones found at seashore.

6. **'ULĪ'ULĪ**: gourd rattle with tapa and feather-fringed top, with small pebbles or hard seeds inside.

7. KĀLA'AU: dance sticks of very hard wood which are struck together to rhythm.

8. **PAHU HULA**: hula drum with sharkskin top, coconut fiber cordage and carved from mature coconut wood.
